

In addition, a team has been established to work with the Vice President for Equality, Diversity, and Community, and the Dean of Students, whose joint role is to manage and promote volunteer activities on campus. The team includes Prof. Itai Ater (Coller School of Management), Prof. Liad Mudrik (School of Psychological Sciences), and Prof. Michal Feldman (Blavatnik School of Computer Science). In addition to activities that I reported in an update a week ago, we are currently recruiting volunteers to assist communities in the south in general, and those surrounding Gaza in particular. A few days ago, I visited our own Prof. Yftach Gepner from the Faculty of Medicine, whose brother was injured in the terrorist attack there. In the heat of the moment, Yftach managed to rescue his brother, who is now recovering in the hospital. We hope to send additional volunteers to other communities in the south in the coming days. The university campus is functioning, but unfortunately without many of its students. It is important not to leave our reserve soldiers behind either financially or academically! Students called up to serve have been exempted from rent at the university dormitories for the month of October (it should be noted that the dormitories are not owned by the University), and all TAU students have had their tuition fee payments postponed. Through the Student Success Center, and thanks to our generous donors, we are

responsibly. We take very seriously any campus expressions of solidarity with Hamas terrorists. The TAU Rector recently distributed a letter clarifying that TAU will take a firm hand – within the limits of the law and university regulations – against these instigators, whose numbers are less than a handful. In the same vein, we must strongly denounce the shocking claim being made here and around the world, including on some university campuses in the US, that the Hamas massacre is a "political issue" about which differing views can be expressed under freedom of speech. There can be no greater mistake. There is no difference between this claim and the claim that the Holocaust is a controversial political issue that is open to legitimate debate. At the same time, we are facing a worrisome phenomenon of incitement via social media, most probably by people outside the university community, against Arab students. False stories and baseless

so far. Is there a particular moment that made you really feel validated? A few days ago we were out shopping for supplies for displaced families, and we filled a cart full of baby food. A woman looked at our cart and asked if we had a big family. We told her it was for the babies who have been evacuated from the south and the north, and her eyes immediately filled with tears and she thanked us for what we were doing. We've had a lot of moments like this, and it feels amazing to be able to contribute in some way during this incredibly difficult time.



weeks, is especially important for international graduate students and postdocs who may need assistance to relocate from Israel quickly. For example, on a personal level, being offered visitor status and help finding accommodation has made it possible for me to remain productive while not worrying about issues such as transportation and housing outside of Israel. Other ways the international community can help are to understand delays in work being done and help with extensions on essential deadlines. For example, I received a two-week extension on a reference letter submission deadline with the help of colleagues at the institution in question. Do you have any other message you wish to share? While in Israel, I heard from many family members and friends. I was glad to hear from them and their support meant a lot. However, if you have loved ones impacted by the war, please consider how you communicate when contacting them; "Are you safe?" or "What do you need?" is excellent. Please don't ask about specific events, as this makes it more difficult to not hyperfocus on everything that is happening.
